## **5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter**

In the last 5 years as your parish priest I may have mentioned on occasions that I am a great fan of The Beatles. I think I must have in my possession nearly all their recordings.

My favourite album, my favourite record of theirs is the L.P. 'Abbey Road'. I remember clearly as a 16 year old buying 'Abbey Road' on the day it was released on the 26<sup>th</sup> September 1969.

My favourite song on the entire album is called 'Golden Slumbers' and it begins with these words: "Once there was a way to get back homeward, once there was a way to get back home."

The song always stirs up in me the emotions of longing, yearning and nostalgia for my home in 1969 when all those I loved were still alive. Even now, at the age of nearly 67, part of me would like to get back to my home and my family of 1969.

As the American poet Maya Angelou wrote: "The ache for home lives in all of us, the safe place where we can go as we are and not be questioned."

For those of us that have these feelings, the longings, the yearning and the ache for home, there is Good News. That Good News, of course, is Jesus Christ.

For in this Sunday's Gospel Jesus tells us not to be afraid or to let our hearts be troubled. For the true home that we long for, we yearn for and we ache for, awaits us and there is a way for us to get homeward. For Jesus is the Way, He is the Truth and the Life.

Jesus tells us that there are many rooms in the Father's House and if we have faith and trust in Him He will lead us homeward to our true home in the Father's House, to the safety and security of heaven.

And in that holy and sacred place there is no more pain, suffering and tears. The longings, the yearnings and the ache of the human heart will be no more.

If we believe in the power of Jesus to save and to raise up then we can be confident and look forward to the time we will sit down, with all those we have ever loved, at the table in the Father's House to celebrate the eternal heavenly banquet surrounded by the awesome Glory of God.

We believe that the Mass, the Eucharist is a glimpse of heaven, a foretaste of the heavenly banquet that awaits us in our true home of the Father's House.

At this present moment we long, we yearn and we ache for the time when we can return to the home of our churches to be fed and nourished by Jesus through the Mass, through the Eucharist.

However, Jesus tells us in the Gospel He is the Way and if we keep faith with Him He will lead us home, He will lead us to celebrate Mass once again. He will offer Himself in the Eucharist so we can once again glimpse heaven and have a foretaste of paradise and be united with our loved ones who celebrate the heavenly banquet in our true home of the Father's House.

In the Gospel Jesus tells us not to be afraid. I would be less than honest despite my faith, in Jesus, to say I am not afraid. I am not afraid for myself, no I am afraid for those I love and cherish, I am afraid for you my dear and precious people.

I pray that none of us will be troubled by the evil of the coronavirus. However, despite my worries and fear I absolutely refuse to be defined or controlled by some virus.

For we are Christians, we believe in Jesus Christ, the Way, the Truth and the Life. It is He and only He who defines us as human beings, who gives us our identity.

Jesus will lead us homeward, through this current fear and darkness, to once again celebrate together the Eucharist, the Holy Mass.

Someone once said: "Home is not a place, it's a feeling".

As long as we feel the presence of Jesus within us, as long as we feel and care for our absent friends, family and loved ones then our community is as real and as authentic as any physical structure we call home or a church building.

We will get back home, we will return to our churches to celebrate Mass.

For Jesus has promised us that He will lead us to the place and the people we long, yearn and ache for.

I refuse to be a victim. Despite the lockdown we are free people created in the image and likeness of Almighty God.

Jesus will lead us home, Jesus will guide us to the open doors of our churches to once again celebrate the Mass.

In these dark and uncertain days may we truly believe that the coronavirus is not in control, no God is in control of our future and destiny.

May God bless you and keep you safe.

## **“Stretch Out Your Hands”**

### **The Catholic Children’s Society (Plymouth) needs your help now more than ever !**

In every country and community across the world, the coronavirus pandemic is turning children’s lives upside down. We urgently need your help so that we can continue to support vulnerable children and their families throughout the Diocese. The number of grant applications we receive has already begun to increase as a result of Covid-19 with more families needing our help to meet their basic needs such as a working cooker or a proper bed or cot for their children to sleep in. And we envisage that this number will continue to rise as more families living in Devon, Cornwall and parts of Dorset are affected.

We rely entirely on the generosity of our supporters, parishioners and schools but with so many of our planned fundraising events cancelled, we now need to look for alternative sources of fundraising and funding. **And this is where your help comes in please.**

We have already secured some funding from the Devon Coronavirus Response & Recovery Fund and we have also set up a crowdfunding page. We hope to raise between £3,000 and £6,000 which would enable us to help at least 40 children directly (although more likely 80-100 family members would directly benefit). £6,000 would allow us to purchase for example –

- 10 children’s beds/cots and mattresses - £1,000
- 10 cookers - £2,000
- 10 fridge/freezers - £1,500
- 10 washing machines - £1,500
