16th Sunday in Ordinary Time – homily

Mother Teresa once said, “If you judge people, you have no time to love them.”

In today’s Gospel Jesus uses a parable of the ‘darnel’ to proclaim the patience, kindness and forgiveness of almighty God. A ‘darnel’ is a noxious weed which grows amongst wheat. The servant in the Gospel, seeing this weed among the wheat, wants to go out and remove the darnel. But his master cautions patience, let darnel and wheat grow together until harvest time, only then will judgement be made about what will be saved and gathered.

I think the message of the parable is that often we want and demand instant judgement. Many of us want those who appear to have done harm, damage and evil things to others to face judgement from God here and now. Many of us want to bring the ‘Last Judgement’ into the present time.

We judge by human standards, God judges by His standards.

To some God’s patience and forbearance, as expressed through Jesus Christ, towards wrong doers is a scandal.

However, Jesus wants no premature judgement. Our Lord will never condemn or judge people by their past. Jesus allows people to learn, to change, to grow and move on.

God’s love for us is unconditional and universal. It is available to us all. The Dalai Lama has said, “Love is the absence of judgement.”

Jesus is well aware that all communities are a mixture of the good and bad, the weak and the powerful. And Jesus reminds us the last word said about everyone, their judgement does not come until death and then it is the job of God, it is not our job or duty.

As Christians, as followers of Jesus, we have no authority, we have no right to pronounce the final judgement on everyone. As St. Paul says: “There must be no passing of judgement. Leave that until the Lord comes.” (1Cor 4:5)

As human beings in our daily lives we have to make judgements about all sorts of things. We constantly have to judge situations in our lives, we have to make decisions. Unfortunately at times our judgements can be flawed.

Jesus calls on us to be Christians with open minds and open hearts. Jesus asks us to choose love over hate, light over darkness and compassion over judgement.

Let’s face it, most of us find it easy to judge others. But it is more difficult to try to understand others and their actions.

Understanding requires us to accept the values and teachings of the Gospel. For it requires compassion, patience, and a willingness to try to see the potential good in everyone.

The teaching of Jesus tells us that through judging we separate and divide. Through understanding, through forgiveness we grow and we try to bring about unity.

We live in a world where often it seems that people who do wrong and harm thrive and conquer.

However, Jesus makes it clear that there will be a final judgement. All of us, every single one of us will have to give an account to God of how we have lived our lives.

In the end God will see justice is done. As Christians we leave the final judgement to almighty God.

Knowing that this judgement, through Jesus, will be given with love, mercy, compassion and forgiveness.

Of course, we too will also face that judgement. Knowing and believing that in the end we will be judged by God not in terms of what we have done for ourselves, but in terms of what we have done for others.

Meeting a homeless person on the streets, especially if they have nowhere to go that night, can be quite shocking and worrying. Decision-making around how we act for that person, however, needs to remain clear, needs to keep the homeless person at the heart of any decision, but also needs to keep you safe from harm. People experiencing homelessness are among the most vulnerable to COVID-19. Any support needs to minimise the risk of infection.
