## **17<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time – homily**

Over the years as your parish priest I have spoken many times about my parents, my family and my childhood.

Like most of us, I was taught by my parents to have certain values, standards and principles. My sisters and myself embraced these teachings and tried to live our lives by them.

My family values are central to everything I am. In my life I have experienced many changes but the values I was taught all those years ago have remained the same.

Our values reflect what is important to the way we live our lives.

In today's Gospel, using a couple of parables, Jesus proclaims that at the top of our values must be the Kingdom of Heaven, our Christian faith.

Jesus tells us in the Gospel that our faith is a treasure, a pearl beyond all price. As Christians, as followers of Jesus, we must do our very best to hold on to and to protect our faith.

The Gospel tells us that our faith must be our number one priority and the most precious treasure in our life.

We live in a world, we live in a society where many value their lives in terms of wealth, power and celebrity. Many regard the treasures of life in terms of what they have and own.

Many of us dream of having a lovely house, a flash car and money to burn. But none of these kind of things have any eternal value at all.

However, the treasure of our Christian faith, the pearl of the Gospel, has an eternal and everlasting value. With Jesus we possess all that matters, we have the wisdom and value of the Gospel and the promise and pledge of eternal life, the gift of heaven.

The question we constantly need to ask of ourselves is, "Do we really value the gift of faith? Do we embrace and regard our faith as a treasure and a precious pearl?"

If we fail to try to live out our lives according to the values of the Gospel then our faith is more like a hobby rather than the centre and purpose of our existence.

The Gospel challenges us to accept and acknowledge the great truth that not all treasure is silver and gold. The Brazilian author Paulo Coelho, who was educated by the Jesuits, wrote: "Remember that wherever your heart is, there you will find your treasure."

If we have a heart for Jesus, if our faith is the essential value in our life then we have discovered a treasure beyond all price, and a treasure that is eternal and everlasting. Today's Gospel reminds us that we must do our very best never to de-value our faith, to take the kingdom of heaven for granted.

To appreciate our faith, to hold on to the values of the Gospel we need to cherish it through prayer, the Mass and by reading Holy Scripture. And, of course, we are called by Jesus to share the values of the Gospel, to share the kingdom of heaven with others.

There is an old Jewish saying that states: "Who finds a faithful friend, finds a treasure". Jesus is our friend and through His friendship we are given the opportunity of eternal life.

Often the values of the material world are in stark contrast to the values of the Gospel and the Christian faith. But only the treasure that is Jesus has the power to purchase for us a life beyond the grave.

We have a choice, we can sell our soul to try to obtain the treasures of this present and temporary world, or we can discover the treasure of the Gospel and live our lives according to the eternal values of Jesus Christ.

As Timothy Keller has said: "Every treasure on this earth says, 'Give your life to purchase me'. Jesus says 'I'm the one treasure who died to purchase you.'"

### **Homelessness- How can we help?**

Meeting a homeless person on the streets, especially if they have nowhere to go that night, can be quite shocking and worrying. To think that an individual will be cold, wet and vulnerable can invoke a host of emotions. Decision-making around how we act for that person, however, needs to remain clear, needs to keep the homeless person at the heart of any decision, but also needs to keep you safe from harm. People experiencing homelessness are among the most vulnerable to COVID-19. Any support needs to minimise the risk of infection.

### **KEEP KITKAT FAIRTRADE**

After a 10-year partnership with Fairtrade producers, Nestle, plans to stop making KitKat with Fairtrade cocoa and sugar? All details on [www.fairtrade.org.uk](http://www.fairtrade.org.uk)

This decision will mean a loss of almost £2 million in Fairtrade Premium each year for co-operatives in Cote d'Ivoire, Fiji, and Malawi, representing 27,000 small scale producers.

The Fairtrade premium, as well as the guaranteed minimum price for their produce, provides a real lifeline for some of the world's poorest farmers. In Malawi and Fiji, Nestle, will stop buying their cane sugar altogether, so not only will farmers lose their Fairtrade premium but also their market. The impact on farmers will be very severe.

The Fairtrade Premium, has enabled producer communities during this pandemic to act quickly to protect themselves against the effects of COVID-19 with protective equipment, hand sanitisers, awareness raising and support for sick families.
