## **Feast of the Assumption – homily**

Saint Augustine once wrote: “Symbols are powerful because they are the visible signs of invisible realities.” For us as Catholics statues are part of our faith tradition. The statues of the Sacred Heart and the saints remind us of the invisible reality and truth of God’s love and how it is possible for Christians to achieve a profound and lasting relationship with the Holy and the Sacred.

If you walk into any Catholic church throughout the world it is almost certain that you will find an altar or a statue dedicated to The Blessed Virgin Mary, the mother of God.

Mary is the greatest of all the saints. For us as Catholics Mary is a visible symbol of how a human being can give a life totally and completely to the will of almighty God.

Mary’s life was a total “Yes” to God and is a sign, symbol and example of how a human being can fulfil their God given potential and destiny.

Today, of course, we celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Church teaches that at the moment Mary’s earthly life ceased she was assumed body and soul into heaven.

Although the dogma of the Assumption was only proclaimed by the Church in 1950, it had been believed and taught for many, many centuries. For belief in the Assumption emerged and was driven by the faith and belief of ordinary Catholics.

Because of Mary’s unique role in sacred and salvation history early Christians could not believe that God would allow His perfect servant to undergo the physical decay that comes to the body at the end of earthly life.

However, the belief of the Assumption and the celebration of this Feast is not just about Mary, it is about all Christians.

For the Feast of the Assumption is a sign and a symbol for us all as it points to what we believe God through Jesus will one day do for us.

We believe that through Jesus our sacred destiny is for our whole person, body and soul to be raised to a new existence in the presence and peace of God for all eternity.

This promise is made to us by Jesus and is fulfilled in Mary and one day will be fulfilled for us.

The Feast of the Assumption is celebrated by the Church so that the example of Mary may make our faith and belief in the resurrection both stronger and more active.

Of course, Mary is not only an example and symbol of our future destiny with God in heaven. No Mary is also an example, a symbol and a sign of how we should try to live out our daily Christian lives.

Her life was totally given over to serving God and supporting His only Son Jesus.

And as the Gospel reading reminds us Mary is a woman and indeed a mother for all people. In the great prayer of the Magnificat that Mary proclaims in the Gospel she gives every Christian hope, faith and trust in the struggles, hardships and sufferings of everyday life.

This feast and the example of Mary is a sign and a symbol of what we are called to be by God. For Mary fulfilled her God given potential totally and completely.

Because of her total and faithful commitment to Jesus she has taken her place in heaven.

Mary gives us hope concerning our eventual eternal destiny. For where Mary has gone one day we hope to follow.

Yes, the Feast of the Assumption of The Blessed Virgin Mary is a beacon of hope for all Christians.

Through Mary’s intercession and trying to follow her example we continue on our journey to eternal life.

One day we too hope to reach our heavenly home and to experience the presence and peace of God.

Until that glorious day Mary reminds us as a symbol and a sign of what we can achieve as people created in the image and likeness of God.

The example of Mary reminds us that we have a glorious future in heaven where decay, pain and suffering has no place.

**Please note:** because face coverings are now compulsory for our acts of worship in the church how we receive Holy Communion has been amended, the following needs to be adhered to:

It is very important that communion is received in the presence of the priest who will stop you if you move away without consuming the Sacred Host.*
